EMERGENCY RESPONSE IN THE HOLY LAND OCTOBER 18, 2023

Catholic Relief Services and our partners are responding to immediate and recovery needs of families displaced and affected by crisis in the Holy Land.

CONTEXT

The crisis in the Holy Land has unfolded into humanitarian catastrophe after the October 7 attack on Israel, which is being met with a bombardment of retaliatory strikes on Gaza. More than 4,300 deaths have been reported across the region, not including the impact of a recent deadly hospital blast in Gaza city that is estimated to have claimed hundreds of lives. An estimated 1 million people, almost half the population, are displaced following an order for people to evacuate the northern part of Gaza.

Intense violence is affecting families in all aspects of life across the Holy Land. Access to food, fuel and water are of tremendous concern. Gaza has been without electricity for several days. Hospitals are on the brink of collapse as fuel reserves used to operate backup generators are almost depleted. Wastewater and sanitation services are overwhelmed, creating the conditions for a public health disaster.

Options for safe refuge are uncertain and limited. Many people who struggle with mobility—people who are elderly, people living with disabilities and those suffering from illnesses—are unable to escape an active, deadly war zone. Additionally, an estimated 50,000 pregnant women face extreme challenges accessing prenatal and maternity care due to risks related to movement, compromised functionality of health facilities, and a shortage of lifesaving supplies.
